What Do You Want for Christmas? This has been a question that has often been asked of us and that we have asked over and over again. I am old enough to remember with great anticipation the massive toy catalogues that were sent out close to Thanksgiving by department

stores. Every night before I fell asleep, I would page through them and dream of a toy that would be the perfect gift for which to ask.

Toy catalogues have long been abandoned. We have been warned that this year delivery services will be overloaded and gifts may not arrive on time. Some staples for baking may be hard to find. Some seats around the Christmas table will remain empty. So, "what do you want for Christmas?"

It may be safe to say that almost all of us can answer with one word, "NORMAL!" However much that may be our desire, it is a want that likely will remain unfulfilled. Instead, let us remember that the gospel account of the birth of Jesus was filled with hardship and the lack of any semblance of normalcy. Perhaps a better answer this year is to find the inner peace of accepting the things we cannot change and to heighten our discovery of ways that we can share the love of the Christ.

--COVID 19 MITIGATION CONCERNS ALTER WORSHIP PLANS--

At the beginning of the pandemic, Session appointed a task force to advise on mitigation issues. This task force is composed of medical professionals as well as those from the research community and those that are active in various community issues. The task force has had its guidelines approved by Session and has modified them regularly as we have been able to receive updated information from both governmental and independent sources. The goal has been to balance safety with the congregational desire to gather and retain some semblance of normality.

In spite of these mitigation activities, a risk of infection does exist if an infected individual attends a worship service. Given the rise in positive rates, the coming holiday season, and students returning from college, the task force met on November 15 to evaluate current conditions. As a result of their deliberations, the in-person worship service is now suspended at least through the remainder of this calendar year. Likewise, the building is closed to all groups.

Though the church office will remain open, we urge you to only visit the office if absolutely necessary. Wearing a mask is required and if your visit is only to pick up an item, please call ahead so that it can be placed in the hallway.

This has been a difficult decision, but one we feel is absolutely necessary for the well-being of all concerned.


PREPARING TO CELEBRATE



Eco-Justice Team News

This will be a very different Christmas for us in our merchandise-driven Western society. Less entertaining and small gatherings will free us up from some of our accustomed spending. Months of a slower pace have led many of us to consider what is truly important and how to simplify our lives. Along with that, it is easy to add climate and environmental decisions into our planning.

First of all, consider banning glitter this year (actually aluminum metalized polyethylene terephthalate, or PET), which breaks down into microplastic beads when washed into rivers, lakes, and oceans. Tinsel and shiny wrapping paper are not recyclable, and end up in landfills, the "gift" that keeps on giving. Plain brown paper or newsprint can be decorated to make them both safe and attractive. In addition, seek out fabric gift bags, make your own, or use recycled scarves. Some of the links at the end of this article offer many suggestions for a green Christmas. Make this year's holiday season not only joyful, but creative and healthy!
