PASTORAL PONDERINGS - WORD, SACRAMENT & ORDER

When one is ordained, the vows that are taken grant authority in the church for certain functions. The first is the word. It grants the ordaned the opportunity to preach the word from the Biblical record, and to be accountable to do ones best to correctly interpret the scripture.

The second function is to duly administer the sacraments. In the Protestant tradition, the two sacraments are Baptism and Holy Communion. As the word sacrament implies, this is a very sacred responsibility. It links our congregation to the ancient rites of the church as it has evolved and witnessed to the world.

The last function, order, is much more denomination specific. In some traditions, it expects the ordained clergy to have sweeping administrative functions. In others, pastors are relegated to executing the desires of the congregation. In either case the ultimate concern is the continued vitality of the faith.

COFFEE HOUR HOSTS NEEDED

Coffee hour is an important time of fellowship each week. It's a time to welcome visitors and to catch up with anyone you missed during the Passing of the Peace.

Since we've resumed live worship following Covid, we've lost several coffee hour hosts.

Typically, each coffee hour host serves twice a year, but with the loss of hosts we're short to complete the schedule without either asking some hosts to serve a third time, or having coffee hour come out of the church budget.

Neither of those options is a terrible solution, but if anyone has been thinking, I would like to be a coffee hour host, now would be a great time to start!

Here are some details about what coffee hosting entails, Please don't be scared - I always make sure that someone will be available to help new hosts find everything in the kitchen and to show them how to make the coffee.

- Snacks The coffee hour host provides all the treats for the adults (kid snacks like Goldfish crackers and fruit snacks are provided by the church). There are trays in the kitchen for any items you bring. Most hosts include simple treats like mini muffins, cookies, or bagels. Some hosts will go above and beyond with items like fruit or cheese and crackers, but these <u>are optional</u>.
- Drinks The coffee hour host prepares coffee, hot water for tea, and lemonade. All supplies are provided by the church. During the summer, we only do cold drinks.
- Set up Typically the tables are already in place for coffee hour, but the host will have to put tablecloths on a few tables and bring out all the cups, plates, napkins, drinks, snacks, etc.
- Clean up -There is always a Bubble Brigade dishwasher volunteer to clean the mugs and plates, but the coffee hour host is responsible for washing any trays, coffee urns, or other items that can't be run through the dishwasher, as well as cleaning the tables and sweeping the floor in Fellowship Hall.

Global Clean Energy Action Forum September 21 - 23

This September in Pittsburgh, the U.S. will host the first ever Global Clean Energy Action Forum (GCEAF). The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) is partnering with Carnegie Mellon University (CMU) to host the 2022 GCEAF. The forum will be held at the David L. Lawrence Convention Center September 21st-23rd. According to gceaf.org, the venue itself, Pittsburgh, is significant. As Secretary Granholm put it, the Steel City of Pittsburgh is "a town that exemplifies how a legacy energy and industrial-dependent economy can be transformed into a technology and innovation powerhouse."

The three-day event will feature a high-level plenary, topical roundtables with energy and science ministers from 31 countries, CEOs and experts, side events, technology demonstrations, and other activities. The global clean energy transition is aiming to bring "enormous opportunities and benefits" to our communities, workers, and industry. The many varieties of clean energy will be discussed as well as climate change and the COVID-19 pandemic. CMU will bring together a local host committee to ensure voices and perspectives from across our community – including industry, government, labor, non-profit organizations, and philanthropy are included. Cities around the world are exploring ways to deal with the ever-growing negative effects of climate change. Pittsburgh has the resources to be in the forefront, for which we are grateful!



Why do White Americans have on average 13 times more wealth than African Americans? There have been government policies after the Civil War that have led to this disparity. Bread for the World has documented some of these policies. Here is their Policy # 3 contributing to the gap.

Minding the Gap: Policy #3 The National Housing Act of 1934, Part 1

Policies under this law guaranteed federally-backed loans to whites and legally refused loans to blacks and anyone else who chose to live in or near black neighborhoods. This practice, known as "redlining," targeted entire black neighborhoods and identified them as "Grade D." This made it nearly impossible for appraisers in the private sector to do business in black neighborhoods because all the residents were considered bad credit risks.

How does inequality in access to home loans contribute to the racial hunger, income, and wealth gaps?

Homeownership is the primary way for American families of modest means to build wealth. African Americans have been denied equitable access to mortgage loans, and therefore homeownership, for roughly the past four generations. Areas with a low rate of homeownership have fewer assets, equity, and resources. Consequently, African American neighborhoods are far more likely than white neighborhoods to have areas of concentrated poverty, meaning that a sizeable proportion of residents live below the poverty line.
