Dear Members and Friends,

The novelist André Aciman said, “Music is the un-lived life.” This rings true to me. Music stirs something deep in the soul that no other thing can touch. It convinces us of an unexplored depth and possibility within our lives. All art functions in this way: it reaches for a thing we all know in part, a thing we all long for, but which can only be expressed in symbols like notes, or brushstrokes, or words. Preaching is an art too, for preachers deal in shadows, and symbols, and hints of things too great to fully know or understand. Like all artists, preachers never fully grasp the message they’re conveying. The beauty, and hope, and possibility, and peace that they proclaim are as urgent and elusive to the preacher as they are to the hearer. These things belong to all of us, though we know them only in images, parables, stories, songs...glimmers. “Here and there, now and then” God reaches into our lives powerfully, then the moment fades.

That’s why Christians believe that God comes to us not only in shadows, and in music, and in words, but above all in a human life: Jesus—who in turn commissions us to embody love and goodness to the world around us. It’s marvelous in its simplicity: immerse yourself in all the mysterious wonder that God is, then carry that fullness into your relationships. The untold mystery of faith is expressed best in art, but seen and known best in ordinary human lives. It has to be modeled, however imperfectly.

This is one of the best things about church. Not only does it express the goodness of God in all manner of art, but it puts us in touch with others who are also reaching for the light, bringing their imperfect stories together to be shared, known, and healed.

So...why do I spend all this potential sermon-fodder on a newsletter that I fear few will read? Because the newsletter lands in more hands than my sermons, and I am putting out a plea. We need to know each other. Our children and youth need to see adults and seniors who are living into Christ’s call upon their lives—imperfect people who sense that there’s more to life than what we see, and who are making meaning by following in the way of Jesus. Our young people need to see faith lived-out in people’s lives. Ask yourself this: Would your children or grandchildren even know people in their 60s, 70s, 80s, or even 90s outside of church? When my daughters were small, they adored sweet Marian Brannan, well into her 90s, and she adored them. They still talk about her, and they never would have had such a relationship if not for this church.

It’s time to build inter-generational friendships at our church—to flesh out the gospel in human relationships and lives. Mark your calendars for Sunday, October 19, when we will host a second-hour event called “Partnering for Faith: Investing in the Next Generation.” We will talk about the power of intergenerational friendships, how such relationships are nurtured in the congregation, and how you can participate. There will be booths representing various ministries, personal testimonies, a time for Q&A, table discussions, snacks and next steps. Please plan to stay for second hour on October 19! Our kids need the resources of faith to live into the future. They will only develop “sticky faith” (faith that sticks) if they know people who are, however imperfectly, living out their faith today. At their baptisms, you promised to do this! I hope to see you there.

Sunday, October 26, in room 101 – we will briefly talk about all 3 classes and review the older classroom curriculums in more detail (Holy Moly and Connect).

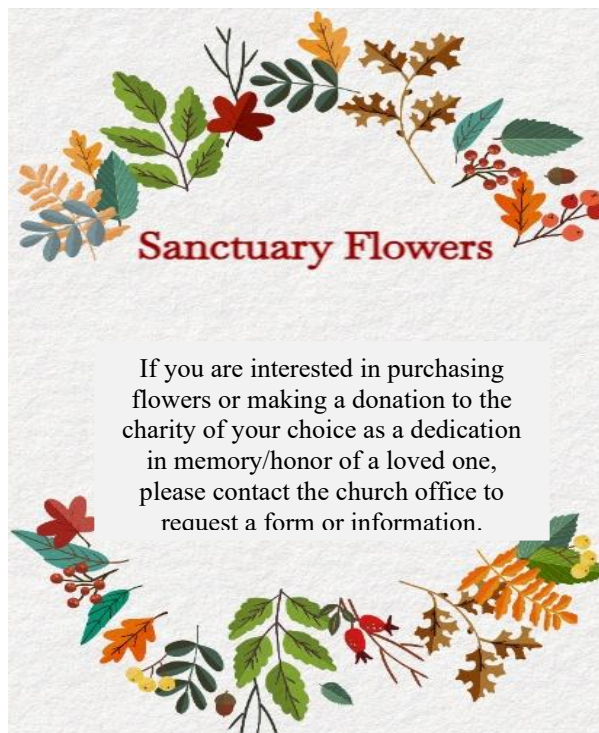
Sunday, November 2, in room 103 – this will be a more detailed training just focused on leading Children's Worship for PreK – 2nd graders.

Faithful Conversations

“Adult Ed” will become “Faithful Conversations” in our new program year. We welcome everyone high school age and older to join us as we learn about and discuss issues of faith. Here are our current plans for conversations in October:

October 5 – Report on the summer mission trips.

October 12 – Report by Chloe Snyder on her summer internship with the Office of Public Policy for the PCUSA

October 19 – A presentation and discussion led by Faith Formation, called “Partnering for Faith: Investing in the Next Generation,” about how adults in our congregation can become more involved in the faith formation of our children and youth.

October 26 – A discussion of the morning’s sermon, led by Rev. Snyder.

FROM THE MISSION COMMITTEE:

Driving PA Forward

One of the projects of our Mission committee is to support the immigrants in Pennsylvania. Since 2020 we have been working on a project known as Driving PA Forward. We have worked with an interfaith Committee to try to get driver's licenses for all immigrants in Pennsylvania.

We took that same legislation to the Pittsburgh Presbytery in 2021 which also passed support for that legislation.

Currently a new bill has been introduced in the Pennsylvania House, HB 1518. This bill would enable an immigrant with a worker's ID to get a driver's license. Currently a campaign is ongoing to get the Governor's support.

HB 1518 will improve the safety of all Pennsylvanians in three ways

Safety on the Roads

Keeping roads safer, economies healthy, and families together.

- From policymakers to law enforcement, from farmers to faith communities, there is consensus that roads and communities are safer when everyone behind the wheel has a license, insurance, and identification. It is necessary to encourage all drivers in PA to obtain: Accessible driving licenses and valid identification.

A standard (Non-Real ID) Driver's License is required for:

- Valid Identification
- Proof of Insurance
- Adequate knowledge of the rules and responsibilities of the road

Economic Impact

The first year of enacting the proposed legislation could see between \$2.76 M to \$4.14 M in revenue from licensing fees alone with a possible \$2.36 to 3.54 M in subsequent years, far outpacing the cost of implementation

Despite the smaller immigrant population, Pennsylvania could expect a \$13 million increase in revenue from taxes, registration fees, license fees, and vehicle-related purchases in the first three years after implementation. This includes annual increases in sales tax and one-time license fees that would be renewed once the license expires. Every 4 years an additional \$30.50 in renewal fees would be charged to the applicant, who is not included in the total estimation since we are looking at licenses issued within the first three years of expansion.

Safeguard our Privacy

The bill would add a host of crucial protections for driver data, including safeguards around sharing personal information. Pennsylvania needs a common-sense approach to processing identification documents without indefinitely retaining private documents and making PA residents vulnerable to having their information used without their consent.

Sunday Mornings for Children & Youth

Sunday morning options run concurrently to worship and focus on learning Bible stories and engaging kids to think about how these learnings can be applied in their world. **Beginning in October, youth will begin working on the Christmas Pageant, which will be performed in worship on Sunday, December 7.**

Three classes will be offered for kids from pre-k through eighth grade during worship. The nursery will still be open for babies and toddlers during worship. Please look below for details on the plan for each age group.

Wonder for Pre-K to 2nd grade

Children preschool through 2nd grade will start in worship with their families. After a Time with Children, kids will be escorted downstairs to room 103, the Children's Worship Room, to hear a Godly Play story. Kids will see, hear, and wonder as they learn from and with each other. Parents may pick up their children in room 103 after worship ends.

Holy Moly for 3rd-5th grade in Room 110

Kids in third through fifth grade will start in worship with their families. After a Time with Children, kids will be escorted to room 110, where they will explore the Old and New Testaments using Holy Moly Sunday school. FROM THE ECO-JUSTICE TEAM:

Many people in our area have begun to plant sustainable gardens filled with pollinator-friendly native plants. Schools are more likely to have butterfly gardens and encourage children to be involved. As fall arrives, we can continue to support God's creatures in easy ways. Here are some ideas to nurture plants and wildlife in your garden:

1. Don't cut back perennials and grasses. Leave them during the winter so they provide seeds for birds, shelter for insects and sculptural beauty during the winter months. Many birds like to dine on the seeds of native plants like sunflowers, asters, and echinacea, so don't deadhead these blooms until spring.
2. Do clean up the vegetable garden. Remove plants such as tomatoes and peppers, as they can harbor disease. You can cover the beds with straw (not weed-containing hay!) or dried leaves.
3. Plant spring bulbs and native ephemerals, such as bleeding hearts, trillium, and bloodroot. You might want to mark them with a stake, so they don't get weeded out in the spring. Fall is also a good time to plant milkweed seeds. Many species require a period of cold, wet weather before they germinate in the spring. It's called cold stratification. Some gardeners keep their seeds in the refrigerator until spring. Either way, make sure they are seeds from locally grown plants.
4. Leave the leaves! Gas powered blowers are noisy and very polluting. According to the California Air Resources Board, a commercial gas powered blower in one hour produces the same emissions as driving a gas powered sedan for 11,000 miles. And their noise will annoy your neighbors! Fallen leaves are vital for a healthy landscape. They provide shelter for insects and butterflies, and nutrition for your soil. If you need to remove them from pathways, rake them into garden beds, or leave them on whatever lawn you may have left. For bigger or tougher leaves, you can run your lawn mower over them to break them down and speed decomposition.
5. Clean your garden tools. You can then swipe a thin layer of oil over them to protect them and prevent rust.

Fall is a beautiful and invigorating season. Use it to ensure your garden's health through the winter to come, as we move into the celebratory season centered on hearth and home.

White Oak Park – Revisited

Last month, we could not hike the selected trail due to a 5K race being held in that area. Instead, we hiked 3 smaller trails in another area of the park. So this month, we will hike the trail we intended to do in September. [White Oak Park](#) is located near McKeesport. The park sits on 810 acres and offers a wealth of amenities including a multi-purpose athletic field, shelters, a wedding garden, playgrounds, a dog park, bocce courts, volleyball courts, horseshoe pits, and trails for walking and hiking. Unique to the park, White Oak Park is home to many unique plant species that exist nowhere else in Pennsylvania. These rare species include trillium, wildflowers, and specific types of ground cover. We will hike the [green trail](#), which is a loop trail around the perimeter of the main section of the park. The guide lists it as moderately difficult. I have not hiked that trail but based on the other trails regular walking shoes will work. But hiking boots are always a safe bet especially if there was recent rain.

We will meet at 9:00 a.m. in the main parking lot and carpool to the hike. The trailhead should be less than a 30-minute drive. The hike should be about 2 hours. So, we will be home around 12:00 p.m. If it rains, we will reschedule. Please email me at gstchild@yahoo.com or call so we don't leave without you.
